3KH said, "I really enjoyed ballet. We did lots of pliés. We performed some of the moves we learned in an assembly which was fun!"






DT slingshot cars

CHRISTMAS CRUNCH - Cookies -

<u>I n g r e d i e n t s:</u> 75g butter, softened 100g golden syrup 225g self-raising flour 100g caster sugar 2 tsp of ground ginger 1 tsp ground cinnamon 1 large egg (beaten) 2 tbsp demerara sugar



Method

1. Together melt the butter and syrup in a pan. Next mix the flour, caster sugar, ginger, cinnamon and egg in a bowl.

2. Once cooled, add in the syrup mixture and stir thoroughly.

3. Roll out into small balls and flatten with a spoon.

4. Bake for 15 to 20 minutes or until golden at gas mark 4/180°C(160°C fan)/350°F. Once cooked, leave to cool on a wire rack.

4. To finish, add a sprinkle of demerara sugar.
